Entering Class is Largest, Most Diverse in GSPP History

The Goldman School of Public Policy student body did not just grow, it also grew more diverse.

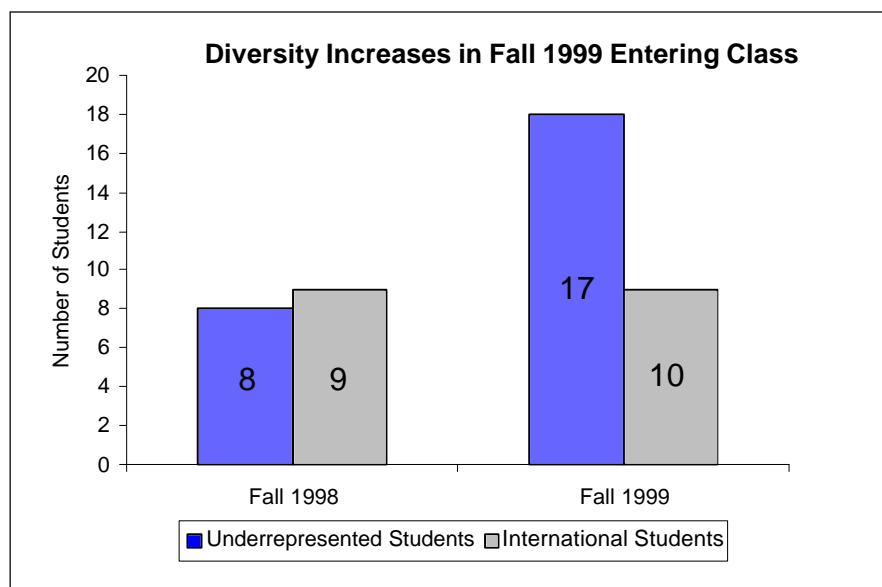
The number of under-represented students in the entering class more than doubled, while overall enrollment increased from 48 to 60 students. Under-represented students will constitute 30 percent of next fall's first-year class, up from 17 percent last year.

Nine international students -- from the United Kingdom, Japan, China, Chile, and Lebanon -- also plan to enroll next fall, the same number as in last year's entering class.

The jump in enrollment by under-represented students is the largest of any graduate program on the Berkeley campus. The combined efforts of the Diversity Council, the student organization Students of Color, and new outreach programs by Admissions Coordinator Jalilah LaBrie and Assistant Dean Mike Treviño, all contributed to the success.

"A lot will be gained for all students," said Michele Prestowitz, co-president of the Students of Color organization. "Now that we've got the ball moving, the key thing is to continue efforts to increase diversity at GSPP," she added.

The Diversity Council has received a second \$5,000 grant from the



UC Berkeley Graduate Division to continue its efforts.

The increase in overall GSPP enrollment is the first part of a planned two-year expansion of the first-year class to seventy-five. The enrollment change was approved last fall by UC Vice Chancellor, Joseph Cerny.

Dean Nacht stressed that "we need to think through carefully how to manage our incremental student growth without sacrificing our pedagogical standards or quality of life." The GSPP faculty and Administration are committed to maintaining quality during this period of growth.

GSPP: Grounded and Growing

A MESSAGE FROM DEAN NACHT

Since my initial message to the GSPP community in the summer of 1998, a good deal has happened in the life of the School, much of which is documented in this issue of Policy Notes. I would like to take this opportunity to highlight a few of the more significant developments among the eleven items I had originally cited as high priorities for this current academic year.

Bricks and Mortar. In January 1999 we successfully completed our transition back to the School's home at 2607 Hearst Avenue. The building is in great shape, warm and functional, and enhances the sense of community that is a hallmark of GSPP. In the meantime, we are continuing to work intensively with campus officials, architects and others to plan a new facility that would be adjacent to our current building. The new facility would house both a 90-seat and a 70-seat classroom, many new faculty offices and a student career center. We have received a creative and attractive schematic design proposal from the architects and are awaiting financial estimates. If all goes well, we will break ground on the new building by the end of this calendar year and we expect to open the facility for the spring 2001 semester.

Expansion of MPP Program. The School has received authorization from the campus to expand the MPP entering class from 50 to 75 students over the next two years as long as the quality of the student body is maintained. This year we received close to 400 applications and look forward to enrolling an extraordinarily talented class of 60 students this fall.

Faculty Recruitment. We have extended an offer to a highly able economist to join our faculty this fall. We are also developing a faculty recruitment strategy for next year that would bring at least one new senior faculty member to the School who would help to build collaborative research in his/her field of policy specialization.

Campus and Other Institutional Connections. We have conducted a variety of joint activities on the campus with the Energy and Resources Group, the Institute of Governmental Studies, the School of Social Work, the Berkeley Program in Soviet and Post-Soviet Studies, the Haas School of Business, the Boalt School of Law, and the School of Journalism, among others. We will continue to explore the prospects of joint faculty appointments and joint degree programs as well. We have also established a working relationship with the Commonwealth Club in San Francisco and are sponsoring several high-profile public events with that esteemed institution.

Alumni. We have sponsored major alumni events in Berkeley, Washington, D.C. and New York City. We have administered an alumni questionnaire, and have several other activities planned to more fully engage the alumni in the affairs of the School.

I believe we have had a productive first year and hope to report on our progress in more detail at the next opportunity.

Happy Trails, Class of '99!

Under the warm California sun, Commencement speaker Congresswoman Barbara Lee welcomed graduating students to “the next chapter” of their lives. Lee implored students to work for “public policies that favor people over profits.”

Focused on current national policy, the second-term Congresswoman, criticized the Clinton administration’s welfare policies as “class warfare.” Lee spoke of what she termed an “alternative progressive vision.” As part of that new vision, Lee is promoting “living wage” legislation designed to pull the working poor out of poverty.

She also beseeched graduates to use compassion, fairness and justice in their policy work. “Government policies can make or break a person’s life,” she said. Lee added that policymakers must also involve the public, since part of their job is to “educate and teach others about the impacts of policies,” she said.

Finally, Lee closed with a story about a policy victory by her predecessor, Congressman Ron Dellums. It took Dellums 12 years to get Congress to adopt sanctions against the apartheid regime in South Africa. That important legislation was instrumental to the fall of apartheid. The message, Lee said, is that “you’ve got to hang in there for the long haul.”

This year’s Outstanding Graduate Student Instructor was awarded to John MacCormick. The Outstanding Advanced Policy Analysis award went to Julia Larkin for her report, “Developing Community Environmental Sustainability Indicators for Oakland.”

The class of 1999 gift was \$2,500 for a new diversity recruitment program, launched by Assistant Dean Mike Treviño.

1999 Wildavsky Forum Lecture

University of Chicago economics professor James Heckman presented the 1999 Aaron Wildavsky Forum. His address, entitled "Policies to Foster Human Capital," tackled the thorny issue of the government's investment in the development and education of its citizens.

The answer from Dr. Heckman was unequivocal: earlier is better. "We cannot afford to postpone investing in children until they become adults, nor can we wait until they reach school age," he said. "Government interventions at an early age that mend the harm done by dysfunctional families have proven to be highly effective."

Heckman also criticized the conventional wisdom on public school spending, arguing that reducing class size and subsidies for low-income students to attend college are of dubious value. "The entire field of educational research is littered with myths like these that guide public policy," he said.

Heckman, who is also a Senior Fellow of the American Bar Foundation, delivered his lecture on April 8, 1999.

First Annual Rhoda Goldman Lecture in Health Policy

Famed Doctor Michael DeBakey Reviews Risk Factors and Public Policy for Heart Disease

Renowned cardiovascular surgeon Dr. Michael E. DeBakey gave the **First Annual Rhoda Goldman Distinguished Lecture in Health Policy** in April. The

annual lecture is founded in the name of Rhoda Goldman, a 1945 graduate of UC Berkeley. In addition to Goldman's work on numerous cultural and environmental causes, she was a dedicated leader in health care.

In 1967 after undergoing a mastectomy, she co-founded the San Francisco Reach to Recovery Program to counsel women after having breast cancer surgery. Goldman also served as President of the Board of Directors of Mt. Zion Hospital and Medical Center from 1975 to 1978.

Dr. DeBakey's inaugural lecture covered the conceptual developments of heart disease, his research on the relationship between stress and the heart, and the role of public policy in health care. In addition, he emphasized the need to educate the public about risk factors and the need to place a higher priority in funding for health policy. Dr. DeBakey also spoke about his experience caring for Russian President Boris Yeltsin after his first heart attack.

Mike Treviño Joins GSPP

Appointed New Assistant Dean

Ten years after graduating from UC Berkeley with a degree in history and economics, Mike Treviño returned to campus this fall as GSPP's new Assistant Dean.

The first year has been full of new programs and initiatives - including the initiation of GSPP's new recruiting and outreach efforts. Mike's efforts, which included informational receptions on both coasts and outreach activities involving alumni, faculty, students and staff, have netted immediate rewards. Applications to the school increased by 15 percent and the number of underrepresented students accepting admission increased by 125 percent.

Mike also oversaw changes in the Career Center, including the addition of videotaped mock interviewing, career services workshops and mandatory career counseling. Plans are also under way for a GSPP Alumni Association to be launched at GSPP's first alumni reunion dinner on Friday, September 24.

After graduating from Cal, Mike earned a joint Law and Education degree from the University of Washington and completed the Harvard Administrative Fellows program. He has held previous appointments at Harvard, Boston University and the University of Washington.



Faculty Research Grants

GSPP and its faculty have recently been awarded several significant grants for research at national and international levels:

The **National Institute on Aging** awarded Professor Jane Mauldon a \$62,000 grant to study grandparents living with grandchildren. The study will focus on low-income and welfare-receiving families. It seeks to predict whether welfare time limits will give parents who are currently on welfare the option to live with their own parents. Doctoral student Nicole Maestas will collaborate on this project.

The **Zellerbach Family Fund** has awarded GSPP \$12,500 to study the success of a Contra Costa County transportation program. The program brought mass transit to a low-income area to help residents, particularly welfare recipients, travel to their jobs. Professor Eugene Bardach is the principal investigator. Bardach's research is being assisted by 2nd year students Tim Deal and Mary Walther.

Additionally, the **Ford Foundation** has agreed to fund a conference, lead by Michael Nacht, that will investigate how the Nixon opening to China was seen in Washington, Moscow, and Beijing. The conference will bring together principal figures from each of the three governments.

Policy Leaders Strut Their Stuff

The Clinton scandal is the hot topic at two major GSPP sponsored events

Goldman School of Public Policy events this past year covered the entire spectrum of policy topics – from impeachment to heart surgery.

The Clinton scandal was the subject of two of the most talked about GSPP events. In November, a panel of noted presidential scholars – many with personal experience in embattled White Houses – discussed the long-term implications of the Clinton imbroglio. Entitled “The Clinton Crisis: Choice and Consequence,” the panelists included Richard Neustadt, Douglas Dillon Professor of Government Emeritus, Harvard University; Lloyd Cutler, Former Legal Counsel to Presidents Carter and Clinton; Leonard Garment, Former Legal Counsel to President

Nixon; and Nelson Polsby, Professor of Political Science and Director of the Institute of Governmental Studies, UC Berkeley. Dean Michael Nacht moderated the spirited debate on the subject. While opinions on the implications for President Clinton and the Office of the President varied widely, the group did reach a consensus that the Office of the Independent Counsel had suffered serious harm as a result.

In the spring, former top Clinton aide George Stephanopoulos spoke from personal experience about his experiences in the White House, including his pride and shame in the President and his actions. In a speech sponsored by GSPP and the Commonwealth Club of California, Stephanopoulos

forcefully defended much of the President’s foreign policy record, including his work for peace in the Middle East and Northern Ireland. Stephanopoulos also pointed to Clinton’s success in management of the Ameri

can economy.

State policymakers also shared their insights with the GSPP community. Grantland Johnson, California's new Secretary of Health and Human Services, spoke about his priorities in health policy, specifically care for the uninsured.

In April, GSPP hosted a panel entitled, "The New California Policy Agenda: A Legislative Perspective." Assemblywoman Dion Aroner, California Legislative Analyst Elizabeth Hill (MPP '75), and Senate Office of Research Director Elizabeth Kersten (MPP '71) provided their perspectives on Governor Gray Davis' legislative agenda. The panelists focused on education initiatives, as well as a host of other hot legislative topics, including the state's infrastructure needs, child support collection system, and the fiscal relationship between state and local

Faculty Update:

Friedman Serving as APPAM President

GSPP Professor Lee Friedman, current President of the Association for Public Policy Analysis & Management (APPAM), delivered the presidential address at the October 1998 APPAM conference in New York. Professor Friedman discussed the lessons of the consistent failure of public policy professionals to curb the success of peanut lobbyists in gaining subsidies for their clients. His

speech, entitled "Peanuts Envy?" was published in the spring 1999 issue of APPAM's *Journal of Policy Analysis and Management (JPAM)*. It is also part of the GSPP Working Paper Series, #239.

Mauldon Evaluates Cal-Learn Program

Jane Mauldon has embarked upon a research project that seeks to answer a timely policy question regarding the effectiveness of California's Cal-Learn program.

Cal-Learn is a program that offers teenage parents financial incentives and case management ser-

vices to help them graduate from high school. Mauldon's research discusses interim results of a randomized trial that is intended to separately distinguish the impacts of the two Cal-Learn components (financial incentives and case management), as well as distinguish the impacts of

these components from the effects of "No intervention". In addition to reporting comparisons of outcomes across randomized groups, the paper raises methodological questions, such as how to interpret effects of incentives if participants do not know that they are eligible for them.

GSPP Alumni Association To Be Formed

Interested alumni have been working on the formation of a GSPP Alumni Association (GSPPAA). Led by Assistant Dean Mike Treviño, meetings with alumni were held in April in Washington, D.C. and in Berkeley to discuss and develop the constitution and by-laws.
